Ada's Life Story

"Ada Lee is too good for her own good." It was something one of Ada's cousins often said about her because she took the pain and hurt of others to her heart. Her children believed she cared more about other people than she did herself. Because she cared so deeply and worried so much, her daughter Diane often warned her with a laugh, "God sent Jesus in the world to die for mankind, not Ada." To that Ada responded, "It's a sad person who don't care about other people."

Ada, the daughter of George Ross, Sr. and Lizzie Mae Ross, was born in Grenada, Mississippi, a beautiful Delta town that sits halfway between Memphis, Tennesse and Jackson,

Mississippi on the Yalabusha River. In 1945, a very young Ada Ross married Elmore Taylor and moved from Grenada to Steele, Missouri, joining her parents and other family members who had arrived earlier. Three weeks after arriving in Missouri, the first of Ada's ten children, Lizzie Mae, was born.



Like most poor Black women from the south, Ada

left school early and spent a fair amount of time working hard in the cotton fields or other people's houses. But her real life's work was raising her ten children. She depended on God to help her with that task. One of her favorite Bible passages was the 23rd Psalms; the other was Psalms 91, particularly the first two verses: "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust."

She needed a refuge in 1990 when she lost her seventh child, Delois. After the loss of Delois, Ada became even more protective of her children. "I'm not going to let another one of my children slip away from me," she said. And she didn't.

Ada's faith helped to sustain her. She

was a member of the Seventh
Day Adventists. Shortly
before her death while
living with her daughter,
Wurline, she joined Mount
Vernon M.B. Church in
Kansas City where Rev. Don
Givens is the pastor.

"Mama loved everybody," said Lizzie Mae, Ada's firstborn. That love was returned tenfold by all of her ten children: Lizzie Mae Warren, Caruthersville, Missouri; John Edward Taylor and wife Shirley, Chicago;
